
MESSAGE FROM JANE

MERMAID SCHOOL

The central focus of our bodies is the backbone, and mermaids are no different.

I developed the 'Undulating Line' technique to help get dynamic and graceful movement into a drawing from the get-go.

We will start by drawing the spine and allowing the rest of the body to flow from there. The more movement your Undulating Line has, the more 'wriggle' your mermaid will have!

Practice is fun! I want you to note how loose an imperfect my lines are and to allow yourself that same leniency! Drawing can be such a joy if you don't demand instant mastery from yourself. So we will start with a warm up.

Then I'll show you some ways that I love to build bright and beautiful backgrounds with watercolour and INKredible inks to make a Rainbow Ocean.

For our final art piece we'll add the mermaids we practiced to the Rainbow Ocean.

A SPLASH OF MERMAIDS

A congregation of mermaids is called a splash!

In this warm-up sketch-ercise we practice the Undulating Line while playing with added variety to your drawings. Explore diversity of color, size, hair and fin designs.


3. Add the hips and tail. Play with proportions to see how curvy or slim you can make your mermaids!



6. Once the paint is dry, draw on the different details. Try and add much variety as you can.



 Start with drawing several undulating lines on one page. Leave room so you can fit in the extra details.



 We will look at arms in more detail later, so for now a simple line will suffice.
Flip it at the end to mimic movement.



7. Keep your lines relaxed and let 'mistakes' happen as I will show you a great way of 'fixing' them on the following page.



2. Decide which end is the top of each mermaid and add an oval for the head, then neck, shoulders and upper torso.



5. Let's make each mermaid a different gorgeous skin colour! I suggest using matte acrylic paint.



8. I have used a waterproof black pen, so the lines don't smudge in the following steps.



9. Tail time! I am going to use watercolor because it's easy to get color variety that adds to the illusion of movement.



12. I like to paint with the movement of the subject to add to the drama of it. Be confident in your brush work!



15.For each mermaid tail use a different combination of watercolour.



10. For each mermaid I am using two versions of a colour. I start with the lighter one.



13. Because I used a matte acrylic paint, the watercolour works well over it (gloss or satin paint will resist the watercolor).



16. Use a white paint pen to clean up stray lines and refine features (white paint and a brush works too, the pen is just easier!).



 Then add the darker color to areas that would get less light as the mermaid swims through the ocean.



14. Add some lighter highlights to the 'high points' such as cheekbones, collar bone, bridge of nose.



17. Create a background behind them, or cut out and arrange your school of mermaids!





MAKE A SPLASH!

What better home to give our mermaids than one made of

water? Watercolor that is! You can spray the colours described straight into your journal or on to larger sheets of watercolor paper that can be used to make a hand bound journal. The choice is yours! I like to make my own sprays from tubes of watercolor, and mix them with INKredible inks



 Gather your supplies. You will need watercolor, water based inks, mister or spray bottles, and distilled water.



2. Squeeze some of the ink or watercolour into the bottle. Option: Add a small ball-bearing, bead or marble to act as a mixing ball.



3. Add the distilled water and screw closed. Mix the ingredients by shaking the bottle.



4. Make sure to label your sprays with the mixtures you have made, so you can repeat the magic if needed!



6. Layer your colours. If you are using watercolour paper, you can make the paper as saturated as you like.



7. Play with the way you spray and angle your paper. Each change will create a different spray and drip patterns.



5. Test your sprays. If you want more intense color, open and add some more watercolour paint or ink, mix and test again.



8. Let the paint dry, and then spray again! Continue adding layers of color, letting them dry in between!



RAINBOW OCEAN

For our main piece we will draw our mermaids on a rainbow ocean! 1. To sketch out your mermaids, try a watersoluble tool such as an Aquapastel or watercolour pencil, that way you can make changes more easily as you go.



 Paint your mermaid's skin in matte acrylic. Try and get some shade variety! Let this layer dry completely.



3. Add your face details with pens, pencils, paint or whatever you like!



4. Colour the tail and add a top if you want. Add flowing lines for the hair.



5. Add accessories in gold pen - think fanciful earings, bangles, necklaces! You can add metallic touches to fins as well!



 In watercolour, paint a drop shadow where the mermaids' bodies would block like will add dimension



 Using a white crayon, add highlights where light beams would catch on your mermaids.





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
